


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WHAT WE DO.

RRD can be described as a social enterprise. Its main activity is to operate the Resource Recovery site in Lake Road.

RRD is part of a network of community recycling centers that operate under the guidance of Auckland Council. The Council is the legal owner of the Lake Road site. RRD has a contract with Auckland Council to operate the site.

The contract stipulates several key performance indicators that the RRD Trust is required to meet. For example we are required to meet targets for diverting waste from landfill. As the name suggests we aim to maximise the recovery of resources through a variety of means including education and raising awareness.

The RRD Trust also operates a landscape supplies business and more recently has added a waste bin service to the local community.





Being a registered charity there are no shareholders. The Trust is governed by a Board of Trustees but ""owned"" by the community. The Trust is in a solid financial position thanks to the efforts of the foundation Trustees. The Trustees have a policy of maintaining a rainy day cash reserve fund and providing for some items of capital expenditure. Beyond this it is the intention of the Trust to distribute surplus funds to community groups operating within the Trusts catchment area.



GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT.

The Trust is governed by a Board of Trustees who meet regularly to set goals and objectives and to review progress.

ANDREW CORNWELL CHAIR

Andrew has been a resident of Devonport since 1994. Much of his career was with Sony Pictures as General Manager for New Zealand overseeing the theatrical and home entertainment businesses. He spent nine years on the Board of the New Zealand Film Commission and New Zealand Film Production Trust, He has also served as Trustee and Chair of the Show Me Shorts Film Festival Trust. a not-for-profit. 


ADAM




PETER

BUSINESS OPERATIONS.

The operational side of our charity has enjoyed a successful year.

Our health and safety standards have been consistently high, with no lost time injuries for the year. Staff are well engaged and take an active role in ensuring we maintain a safe work place for staff and customers.

Sales increased 14% from the previous year a good result considering the slow down in the economy Our key services complement each other and give our business resilience against market fluctuations.

The opening of our new retail store was another key highlight. Since the opening we have been able to greatly improve our stock levels and presentation, which has led to many more items being reused and diverted from landfill.

In the later part of the year we introduced our new skip bin service. Construction waste makes up a considerable percentage of waste in Auckland. As well as reducing truck movements along Lake Road we are achieving very high diversion rates from landfill.

RRD made grants to a number of community groups. Most notably Restoring Takarunga Hauraki received \$30,000 to assist them to build their own nursery. North Shore Football Club received \$11,000 to towards clubroom improvements. Grants were also made to the Ngataringa Organic Society and to support the March children's athletics program.

During the year the Trust changed its name to reflect the key purpose of what the Trust is trying to achieve. Along with this change was the introduction of new distinct branding.





DIVERSION FROM LANDFILL.

A key objective is to maximise the diversion of waste from landfill. During the year we diverted the following quantities of waste.

Waste Stream Description	Total Diversion
Wood	350 tonnes
Green Waste	1300 tonnes
Scrap Metal	200 tonnes
E-Waste	2 tonnes
Mixed Recycling	60 tonnes
Polystyrene	600 cubic meters

In addition

- Our Reuse shop found new life for 250 tonnes of discarded goods
- Landscapes Supplies sold over 2000 cubic metres of garden products made from recycled green waste.

Our Trust diverted
